Center for International Trade Development (CITD)-Global Trade & Logistics (GT&L)

Retail, Hospitality, and Tourism / Learn & Earn (RHTLE)

MERCED College hosts the Central and Mother Lode region's Deputy Sector Navigator (DSN) for Retail, Hospitality, and Tourism industries from San Joaquin to Kern as well as Amador to Inyo Counties.
